With this in mind, the Board is keen to press on. The later we begin, the longer we delay the provision of quality accommodation to those with the greatest need. The essential thing is to consider the plan as the big picture for the future of the people we care for. There will be time and space for further consideration of the details.

The Board is seeking the Association's support for the sake of present and future clients.

Choice and advocacy Minda's key focus

In 2009, Minda reintroduced the Minda lectures in the form of the Open Mind seminars.

The seminars aim to enlighten, educate and share the knowledge of experts in the field of intellectual disability.

The first Open Mind seminar for 2010 centred around the theme of 'Choice and Self-Advocacy', a key part of Minda's implementation of Person Centred Thinking and Active Support.

Robert Cairney, Minda's Deputy CEO, explained the significance behind the choice of subject. "Self advocacy is a fundamental aspect of any human rights framework. Having the ability to speak up for yourself is something that many of us take for granted," he said.

Nearly 300 people came to the BankSA Marquee at Brighton on Tuesday 13 April, to hear from keynote speakers, Professor Jim Mansell and Dr Patricia O'Brien. The guests included individuals living with intellectual disability; staff in the disability sector; Dr Ken Rollond, Mayor City of Holdfast Bay; Councillor Carol Bouwens, City of Marion; Wes Ashman,

Minda Vice President; Minda Board members and Minda Association members.

Professor Mansell, a Professor of Learning Disability in the Tizard Centre at the University of Kent in England and Adjunct Professor in the School of Social Work and Social Policy at La Trobe University in Melbourne, spoke about his particular area of interest: community living.

Self advocates, Kerri-Ann Messenger and Lianne Van Mierlo, then came to the stage to talk about their experiences after recently travelling to Geelong, Victoria, to attend a three day national annual conference on self advocacy called 'Having a Say'.

Minda is highly committed to developing a strong self advocacy program and, in the coming months, Minda also anticipates the launch of a training program in self advocacy, to be conducted by the South Australian Learning Centre.

Dr Patricia O'Brien, Chair of Disability Studies and Director of the Centre for Disability Studies at the Royal Rehabilitation Centre in Sydney, then delivered a presentation titled 'Choice, Voice and Advocacy'.

Dr O'Brien presented her inclusive research from workshops and discussions she conducted in Ireland with people with disability and their families.

Her areas of interest include full community participation, advocacy and equal opportunity, particularly for students with intellectual disabilities within university settings.

It was invaluable to hear the most up to date research and findings communicated by those directly impacted and their opinions on work, relationships, finances and accommodation.

Thank you to all guest speakers, attendees, volunteers and staff who made the Open Mind seminar such a success.

Open to the public, Minda's Open Mind seminars focus on current best practice and cover topics specific to the disability sector, with the main intent of enhancing the lives of people living with intellectual disability.

Standing six foot tall in gallant golden glory, a metallic emu sculpture now features as one of Minda's newest characters, delighting those visiting Minda's Remembrance Garden at Brighton.

Wanting to utilise his creative expertise to construct a decorative piece, Minda's volunteer of 12 months, Ron Smith, met with staff from Leverington South and construction began.

The sculpture was created from a combination of steel and stainless steel and was installed in February after six weeks of cutting, drilling, bending and welding.

To achieve the golden finish, an electro-statically charged powder was applied to the steel shape and then covered in a metallic gold paint, which bonded with the powder. The final result is testament to Ron's dedication and craftsmanship.

A highly experienced engineer, Ron is already looking to his next project, which will be to construct a machine enabling individuals to actively participate in the production of pottery items, technically known as an 'extruder'.

Minda would like to thank Ron for his hard work and creative skill, which has added a new element to be enjoyed by everyone at Brighton.

Real Lives, Real Places

Over the past 12 months, Minda has been working towards the introduction of a Person Centred framework for the organisation. The project, known as 'Real Lives, Real Places', will form the underlying foundation of all Minda's core activities.

Real Lives, Real Places will be implemented over five years, with the majority of development and organisation preparedness occurring over the first two years. The aim is that, by December 2014, all service users will have access to service delivery that is based on a person centred thinking approach.

Recently, over 30 Minda staff members attended the LOOP Conference, presented by Julia Farr Association, which focused on person-centred work, community building and leadership. The two-day conference featured esteemed professors from the United States, John O'Brien and Connie

Lyle O'Brien, who are attributed to the conceptualisation of Person Centred Planning.

It proved an important opportunity for staff to hear from John and Connie how Person Centred Planning has changed and is changing the lives of people living with disability in the United States and England, as well as equipping attendees with a deep understanding of PCP and its benefits. This is the 'tip of the iceberg' in educating and upskilling staff in PCP and a rigorous training program has been planned, with training to be rolled out in the latter half of this year.

A significant subproject of Real Lives, Real Places is the Demonstration Project. Beginning in July 2010 and running for 12 months, the Demonstration Project will see approximately 16 individuals living in the community and supported via PCP and Active Support.

The Demonstration Project will build a solid example with the learnings documented,

from which individualised planning can be rolled out across the rest of Minda.

Staff have been nominating themselves to participate in the Demonstration Project and the level of interest – from carers to managers – has been pleasing.

As well as involving staff and volunteers, the project will be taking on a mentor as well as a project officer to ensure that it is managed and coordinated effectively, as its outcome will pave the way for the evolution in service delivery across the entire organisation. Minda recently purchased a residential property at Mack Street, Glenelg, which could potentially be used for the Demonstration Project.

Disability Enterprises at Minda encompasses a range of businesses providing quality products and services.
