



Special relay arrives

TENPIN bowler **Jenny Roberts** will be in the thick of the Special Olympics action – even before the games begin.

Jenny, of Plympton Park, is one of three Minda clients taking part in the Glenelg leg of the Run with the Law torch relay on Saturday, April 17.

And while colleagues **Lachlan Woollett** and **Andrew Tanner** will be the first to carry the “Flame of Hope” as it leaves Minda’s Brighton grounds, it is Jenny, 56, who will light the Special Olympics caul-

dron in Moseley Square. “I’ve been training for the run – it’s not far off and now I’m even more excited about it,” she said.

“I’m going to do South Australia proud.”

The Minda trio will be joined by other runners for the 4.5km run to the Bay, with staff, friends, family and supporters making up the We Can Do It team.

About 40 police officers will also be pounding local footpaths during the morning stage, one of 14 legs in SA.

The event’s state manager

Detective Inspector **Scott Allison** said the philosophy behind the Law Enforcement Torch Relay was to engage with the community and raise awareness of the Special Olympics, to be held from April 19-24.

“We invite people to come down and share in that community engagement and enjoy the event,” he said. “It will be quite a spectacle.”
